Alessandra Abbado President of the Mozart I 4APS Association

Theater organizer, assistant director and production manager. Since 1979 **Alessandra Abbado** has collaborated with prestigious artists and cultural personalities in important theaters, festivals, Italian and europen concert institutions.

Since 2014 she has been President of the Mozart14 Association. She manages and coordinates its social activities.

Together with her brothers, she is the founder of the Claudio Abbado Foundation. Since its creation in 2014, she has been a member of the Board of Directors.



Ramzi Aburedwan

Violist and bouzouk player, composer and orchestral conductor, founder of the AI Kamandjati Association, the music school system in Palestine, and Festival AI Kamandjati

"Each artist is a dreamer, or should be," says **Ramzi Aburedwan** when speaking of his musical journey. "Borders have been created by human beings. But through music we can dream, break down these borders. In music, I feel completely free... I can travel with the sounds wherever I want." The musical oeuvres of Palestinian violist, bouzouq player, composer, arranger and artistic director Ramzi Aburedwan are the living sonic expression of this sentiment. Ramzi's music spans and bridges the embodied pull of Palestinian folk music, the deep emotionality of tarab, the complex harmonic and polyphonic vocabulary of Western music, the spirituality of Sufi traditions, and the playfulness embedded in a variety of improvised world traditions.

The freedoms music offered Ramzi are intimately entwined with his personal history and life experiences. As a child growing up in Al Amari refugee camp (Ramallah, Palestine), Ramzi was exposed to the violence of the Israeli occupation, most especially during the first intifada. He also experienced poverty and lack of access to many things, music education least among them. However, in 1997 a chance encounter led to an invitation for Ramzi to study at the Edward Said National Conservatory of Music, which had opened just a few years beforehand. The encounter with music changed the course of Ramzi's life. From here on, his lifelong purpose and mission combined his own career as a professional musician and artist in tandem with the development of music education and cultural life in Palestine. Ramzi received a scholarship to study in Angers, France, where he completed his studies with honors. His artistic endeavors are anchored in the tremendous hardships, and also the joys, experienced in the places lived. and in his musical travels within in which he and between them. Ramzi is the founder, composer, musical director and driving spirit of several ensembles that have extensively toured Palestine and internationally to critical acclaim.

While still a student in France, Ramzi founded Al-Kamandjâti (2002), a nonprofit organization that today manages a multi-branch conservatory in Palestine and Palestinian refugee camps in Lebanon, establishes introductory music programs in Palestinian schools, organizes events and festivals, and develops locally-based orchestras and ensembles. As part of his directorship of Al-Kamandjâti, Ramzi is also the founder, producer and co-director for several annual music festivals in Palestine, including the Musical Journey for Spiritual and Traditional Music Festival (starting in 2016), the Baroque Festival (2005-2015), and the Music Days Festival (2006-2015). Ramzi and Al-Kamandjâti are the recipients of the Prince Claus Award for Culture and Development (2006), the Takreem Award for Cultural Excellence in the Arab World (2015), and the Stars Foundation Impact Award (2016) for outstanding locally led organizations that improve the lives of children and young people.

The story of Ramzi's life and of Al-Kamandjâti is the subject of several documentaries (It's Not a Gun, 2005; L'archet de la Paix, 2012; Just Play, 2012), a play (Al-Kamandjâti Show, 2008) and a book (Children of the Stone: the Power of Music in a Hard Land, Sandy Tolan, Bloomsbury Press 2015). Ramzi is also a 2017 recipient of the Gandhi Foundation International Peace Award.



Salvatore Accardo Concert violinist, professor, and orchestral conductor

Salvatore Accardo made his debut at 13 and two years later he won Geneva and Paganini Competitions. In addition to playing with world's leading orchestras and conductors, he plays recitals, chamber music, founded the Accardo Quartet, the Walter Stauffer Academy, the Orchestra da Camera Italiana and conducts also opera. He recorded a lot and received many international prizes. He plays a violin Guarneri del Gesù "Hart" 1730.



Alessio Allegrini Musician, founder of Musicians for Human Rights

Alessio Allegrini is principal horn of the Orchestra dell' Accademia Nazionale di Santa Cecilia, of the Lucerne Festival Orchestra and of the Mozart Orchestra founded by Claudio Abbado. At the age of 23 he was chosen by Riccardo Muti as Principal Horn soloist at the Teatro alla Scala in Milan. He has been guest principal horn in prestigious international orchestras, among which: the Berliner Philarmoniker, the Bayerischer Rundfunk Orchester and the Mahler Chamber Orchestra. He has won many international awards, among which the Prague Spring Competition and the A.R.D. Competition of Munich; he has performed as a soloist in many concerts under the baton of such conductors as Claudio Abbado, Riccardo Muti, Myung-Whun Chung, Jeffrey Tate and Antonio Pappano. He is teacher of horn at the Conservatory of Italian Switzerland; as a teacher, he is regularly invited to hold masterclasses in important Academies and Universities worldwide, such as the Royal Academy of Music, the Royal College, the Guidhall School in London, the Birmingham Conservatory, as well as in Latin American and Japanese University. He is also socially committed to supporting projects which aim to improve society through music education. He is founder of "Musicians for Human Rights" and Artistic Director of the "Human Rights Orchestra" supporting humanitarian and social projects with fundraising concerts. In 2006 he received from Don Mazzi's Exodus Foundation the "Premio Internazionale la Casa delle Arti" for his ability to combine his professional commitments and his lifestyle.



Katrin Amunts Scientific director of the Human Brain project;Vogt Institute of Brain research of Düsseldorf; Jülich Research Centre

Katrin Amunts is a German neuroscientist, and well known for her work in human brain mapping. In order to better understand the organizational principles of the human brain, she and her team have created the cytoarchitectonic Julich-Brain atlas, as a basis to integrate multi-level and multi-scale brain data into a common reference brain, and use methods of high-performance computing to generate ultrahigh resolution human brain models.

Katrin Amunts is a full professor for Brain Research, and director of the C. and O. Vogt Institute of Brain Research, Heinrich-Heine University Duesseldorf (since 2013), and director of the Institute of Neuroscience and Medicine (INM-1), Research Center Juelich. Since 2016, is is the Scientific research director of the European flagship, the Human Brain Project. She did a postdoctoral fellowship at the C. & O. Vogt Institute of Brain Research at Duesseldorf University, Germany, and the set up a new research unit for Brain Mapping at the Research Center Juelich, Germany. In 2004, she became professor for Structural-Functional Brain Mapping, and in 2008 a full professor at the Department of Psychiatry, Psychotherapy and Psychosomatics at the RWTH Aachen University as well as director of the Institute of Brain Structure and Function. She was member of the German Ethics Council 2012-2020. Katrin Amunts is the programme speaker of the programme Decoding the Human Brain of the Helmholtz Association, Germany. Since 2017 Katrin Amunts is co-speaker of the graduate school Max-Planck School of Cognition and since 2018 she is a member of the International Advisory Council Healthy Brains for Healthy Lives, Canada.



Giuliano Avanzini Neuroscientist, Istituto BESTA of Milan

Giuliano Avanzini is emeritus chairman of the Departement of Neurophysiology of the Neurological Institute C. Besta of Milano where he spent the largest part of his scientific life. His main research interests are: Basic and Clinical Neurophysiology, Epileptology and Neuromusic. This last line of interest that he developed with the support of the Fondazione Mariani, stems from his belief that a better knowledge of the "musical brain" can significantly advance our understanding of both brain function and biological foundations of music.



Luciano Ballabio Coach, emotional trainer; writer and amateur violinist, Milan

Luciano Ballabio, after obtaining a degree in philosophy, and after various experiences in public schools and private companies, decided, in 1998, to become a freelance educator, coach and emotional trainer, obtaining the AIF (Italian Association of Trainers) certification of quality in 2004. He was a member of AIF-Italian Association of Trainers, FIC-Italian Coach Federation, ICF-International Coach Federation and founding member of the University delle Persone. Four of his projects on team and personal coaching, carried out between 2006 and 2009, received the Mention of Excellence at the Filippo Basile AIF-PA National Awards. He is the author of thirteen volumes, including, in collaboration with others, Personaleprofessionale (personal-professional), Ispirati dalla bellezza (inspired by beauty), Come un'orchestra (like an orchestra) (FrancoAngeli), and Un'Orchestra da amare (an orchestra to love), laVerdi (Skira). In 1986, at the age of 34, he began studying the violin with Adalberto Murari going on to advanced studies with Silvana Pomarico. Since 2006 he has been a violinist with the most important Italian Amateur Symphony Orchestra, laVerdi per tutti, created that same year by the Giuseppe Verdi Symphony Orchestra and Symphonic Choir Foundation of Milan. From 2012 to 2015 Ballabio also played with the Carisch Orchestra and, from 2016 to 2018, the Maria Teresa Agnesi Orchestra of Merate.



Guido Barbieri Music historian, dramatist, co-founder of the HRO Human Rights Orchestra

Guido Barbieri, music critic of La Repubblica newspaper, teaches History and Aesthetics of Music at the "Bruno Maderna" Conservatory of Cesena. "Historical" voice of Rai Radio 3 he dedicates itself, today, to musical dramaturgy, paying particular attention to the "music of reality". He has written texts,

libretti and readings for many theaters in Italy and abroad, in collaboration with some of the most famous Italian musicians, composers and directors: Riccardo Nova, Franghiz Ali Zadeh, Lucia Ronchetti, Silvia Colasanti, Ennio Morricone, Adriano Guarnieri, Paolo Marzocchi, Andrea Molino, Michele Tadini, Mario Brunello, Andrea Lucchesini, Giorgio Barberio Corsetti, Elio De Capitani, Moni Ovadia, Alessio Pizzech and many others. The most important titles are Portopalo. Nomi su tombe senza corpi, Night Commuters, Three Miles Island, Al Kamandjati, based on the story of the palestinian musician Ramzi Aburedwan and so on. Numerous, in particular, the texts and the shows dedicated to the music of the Shoah. Among others, La corda spezzata, a radioplay about Terezin's musicians produced by Radio 3 and presented at the Prix Italia, the adaptation of Aaron Appelfeld Badenheim 1939 and I Cannibali by George Tabori, Le imperdonabili on Etty Hillesum's Diaries, Un violoncello nell' inferno di Terezin, Dove almeno troverò un po' di pace, dedicated to the story of Orlando Orlandi Posti, one of the martyrs of the Fosse Ardeatine, II diario di Dora Klein, Storia di Jean e Jean, devoted to the story of Jean Le Boulaire/Jean Lanier and also the libretto of the opera II Viaggio di Roberto. Un treno per Auschwitz, with music by Paolo Marzocchi.

He still writes essays and lectures for the major Italian musical institutions. He is currently the artistic director of the Guido Michelli Concert Society of Ancona and a member of the artistic director of the National Diary Archive of Pieve S. Stefano. In 2009 he received the Feronia Prize for music criticism.

Luigi Berlinguer President of the The National Committee for the practical learning of music for all students

Luigi Berlinguer was born in Sassari and currently lives in Siena. He obtained his law degree from the University of Sassari and shortly afterward, became its Dean. He continued his academic studies at

the University of Siena and held, among other roles, that of Director of the Department of Political Studies, Political-Legal History and subsequently that of President of the University Commission. He was Rector of the University of Siena from 1985 to 1994 and Secretary General of the Permanent Conference of Italian Rectors (CRUI) from 1989 to 1994. In1993 he was appointed to the Ciampi Cabinet as Minister of Universities, Science and Technology. Berlinguer then served as the Minister of Education between 1996 and 2000 in the cabinets led first by Romano Prodi and then by Massimo D'Alema. In addition, he served in both the Chamber of Deputies and the Italian Senate. He was elected as a member of the European Parliament in 2009, sitting as part of the Progressive Alliance of Socialists and Democrats. There, he served as first vice-chair of the committee on legal affairs and as a member of the Federal Republic of Germany, the French Legion of Honor and the Grand Cross of the Italian Republic.



Francesca Bing Violinist e Music therapist

Graduated in violin at the Cherubini Conservatory of Florence under the guidance of Maestro A.Tacchi, Francesca Bing attended advanced courses with the masters Vernikof, Romano, Skampa, at the Fiesole music school. He was a member of the Italian youth orchestra and of the Mimesis course within the program of the Maggio Musicale Fiorentino in Florence in the role of shoulder of the second violins. Writer and music historian, **Sandro Cappelletto** studied harmony and composition with Robert Mann. To cite some of his principal publications: the first critical biography of Carlo Broschi Farinelli (La voce perduta [the lost voice], EDT, 1995); an essay on Gaetano Guadagni (Nuova Rivista Musicale Italiana, 1993); a political inquiry on Italian opera companies (Farò grande questo teatro! [I'll make this theater great!], EDT 1996). In 2006, his book Mozart – La notte delle Dissonanze [Mozart – The Night of Dissonance] (EDT) was published, dedicated to the mysterious introductory Adagio of String Quartet K 465. In 2014, he published Da straniero inizio il cammino – Schubert, l'ultimo anno [I begin my

journey as a foreigner – Schubert, the final year] (Accademia Perosi). Coming out in 2016 was I quartetti per archi di Mozart [Mozart's String Quartets] (il Saggiatore). He curated and was scientific director of the volume Musica [Music] for the series II contributo dell'Italia alla storia del pensiero [Italy's Contribution to the History of Thought] published by Treccani in 2018. From the year 2020, we have Mozart. Scene dai viaggi in Italia [Mozart. Scenes from his Italian Journeys] (il Saggiatore). For Storia del teatro moderno e contemporaneo [the history of modern and contemporary theater] (Einaudi, 2001), he wrote the essay Inventare la scena: regia e teatro d'opera [Inventing the scene: stage direction and opera theater]. In 2002, with Pietro Bria, he published Wagner o la musica degli affetti [Wagner or music of passion] (Franco Angeli), a collection of reflections by and interviews with Giuseppe Sinopoli, whose II mio Wagner - il racconto della Tetralogia [My Wagner — the story of the Ring cycle] (Marsilio) he edited in 2006. In 2008 the Perosi Academy of Biella published L'angelo del Tempo [The Angel of Time], a volume dedicated to the Quartet for the end of Time by Olivier Messiaen.

Cappelletto is the author of radio and television programs for Rai, the Italian radio and television broadcast company. Scholar of the Rome Philharmonic Academy, he held the position of artistic director from 2009 to 2013. He is a professional journalist and a Santa Cecilia scholar.



Fabrizio Cariati Music therapist

Fabrizio Cariati was born in Germany and moved to Calabria at the age of 11. He graduated in Psychology at the University of Parma and obtained a post-graduate diploma in music therapy at Music Space Italy in Bologna, where he currently lives. He has been singer-songwriter and front man of the folk-rock music group Nuju since 2009. Engaged as a teacher and tutor in a vocational education and training center, he also deals with the prevention of school drop-out through music workshops. He is a music therapist in the juvenile detention center of Bologna.

Fabrizio Cariati is part of the group of professional music therapists of MusicSpace Italy, an association for training and professional promotion of music therapy, which collaborates with Mozart14 in the activities of Leporello and Tamino (oncohaematology and pediatric surgery departments).



Michael Chance Opera singer, Professor at the Royal Academy of Music, London; Artistic Director of The Grange Festival, UK

Michael Chance has established a worldwide reputation as one of the foremost exponents of the male alto voice in all areas of the classical repertoire, in equal demand as an opera, concert and recording artist.

His appearances in oratorio and recital over more than three decades have taken him from New York Carnegie Hall to Amsterdam Concertgebouw, London's Wigmore Hall to Vienna Musikverein, Berlin Philharmonie to Tokyo Opera City. He has had new work written for him by Richard Rodney Bennett, Alexander Goehr, John Tavener, Elvis Costello, Sally Beamish, Harrison Birtwhistle and Master of the Queen's Music Judith Weir, to name a few.

He began his operatic career with Kent Opera under Ivan Fischer in L'Incoronazione di Poppea and Agrippina. He went on to sing regularly with Glyndebourne, Covent Garden, ENO, Maggio Musicale, Opera Australia, Netherlands Opera, Bavarian State Opera and many others in Handel, Britten, Monteverdi, Gluck, and Haydn, as Orfeo, Oberon, Apollo, Giulio Cesare, and other gods and heroes. He has regularly led masterclasses for the Britten-Pears School in Aldeburgh, as well as widespread internationally.

He has sung on over 150 recordings, winning a Grammy in Semele for DG and a nomination in Death in Venice for Chandos. He was awarded the CBE in 2009.

Michael Chance is Artistic Director and CEO of The Grange Festival which launched to great critical acclaim in summer 2017.

He is Patron of Oxford Bach Soloists, Norwich Baroque and Vasari Singers, and Professor at Royal Academy of Music, London, and Royal Conservatorium, The Hague, Netherlands.



Jean Pierre Changeux Neuroscientist Pasteur Institute, Paris, Honorary President of the Department of Neuroscience; Lead Scientist Human Brain Program

Jean-Pierre Changeux is Honorary Professor at the Collège de France & at the Pasteur Institute Department of Neuroscience, Paris.

The publication of his book Neuronal Man: The Biology of The Mind in 1985 brought Changeux celebrity status among the wider public. Since then he has authored or co-authored several other books directed towards the non-scientific public. Notably, Conversations on Mind Matter and Mathematics with the mathematician Alain Connes (1998), What Makes Us Think with the philosopher Paul Ricoeur (2002), Physiology of truth (2005), La beauté dans le cerveau (2016), The Enchanted Neurons with the composers P.Boulez and P.Manoury (2019) which initiated an instructive dialogue between neuroscience and other disciplines.

Jean-Pierre Changeux's academic accolades include the Gairdner foundation award in 1978, the Wolf prize in 1983, the Louis Jeantet Prize for Medicine in 1993, the Goodman and Gilman Award in drug receptor pharmacology in 1994, the Balzan Prize in 2001, the National Academy of Sciences Award in Neurosciences USA in 2007, the Olav Thon international research award in biomedicine, Oslo, Norway, 2016, the Albert Einstein World Award of Science, Hong Kong, 2018, the Goldman-Rakic Prize in Cognitive Neuroscience, New-York 2018.

Jean-Pierre Changeux has been the curator of three major exhibitions on Art and Science: De Nicolo dell'Abate à Nicolas Poussin: aux sources du Classicisme 1550-1650, Musée Bossuet Meaux in 1988, with catalog. L'Âme au Corps, Arts et Sciences, 1793-1993 (with Gérard Régnier), Galeries nationales du Grand Palais Paris in 1993-1994 with catalog. La lumière au siècle des Lumières et aujourd'hui. Art et science : de la biologie de la vision à une nouvelle conception du monde, Galeries Poirel Nancy in 2005 with catalog.



Andrea Cimatti Professor of Physics and Astronomy at the University of Bologna

Andrea Cimatti graduated cum laude at the University of Bologna (1990) and obtained the PhD degree at the University of Florence (1994). In 1995, he was awarded with the Livio Gratton Prize for the best PhD thesis in Astronomy in Italy. After an extended period in Germany and USA, he returned to Italy with a research position at INAF - Arcetri Astrophysical Observatory. In 2006, he was awarded with the Bessel Prize of the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation. Since 2006 he is full professor at the University of Bologna – Department of Physics and Astronomy. He was awarded with Premio L. Tartufari dell'Accademia dei Lincei (2016) and with the title of Commendatore Ordine al Merito della Repubblica Italiana (2017). His main research fields are cosmology and galaxy evolution. Andrea is a founder of the ESA Euclid space mission where he is now involved in the forefront. He published several peer-reviewed articles with high impact. Since 2020, he is visiting professor at Gran Sasso Science Institute. He authored the textbook Introduction to Galaxy Formation and Evolution (Cambridge University Press) and the popular science book L' universo oscuro (Carocci), whose first edition was awarded with the Ist prize of Premio Nazionale Divulgazione Scientifica (Mathematical, Physical and Natural Sciences category).



Marisa Dalla Chiara Professor emeritus of Logic and Philosophy of Science, University of Florence

Maria Luisa Dalla Chiara, professor emeritus of Logic and Philosophy of Science at the University Florence is a past president of the "International Quantum Structures Association" and of the "Italian Society of Logic and Philosophy of Science". She is the author of books and articles concerning the following fields: quantum logic, quantum computation, foundations and philosophy of quantum theory, semantics of music. With Roberto Giuntini, Riccardo Luciani and Eleonora Negri she has written the book From Quantum Information to Musical Semantics (College Publications, London, 2012).



Michele Dall'Ongaro President of the Accademia Nazionale di Santa Cecilia, Rome

Michele Dall'Ongaro was born in Rome in 1957.

He studied at the Rome Conservatory, furthering his studies in composition with a PhD with Aldo Clementi, and in conducting with Franco Ferrara.

In 1975 he co-founded "Spettro sonoro", an ensemble dedicated to contemporary music. in 1979, they were was first to perform the complete musical compositions of Friedrich Nietzsche. As a pianist, he has collaborated with the Rai Symphony Orchestra in Rome, and with the Orchestra of the Teatro dell'Opera in Rome, and taught in several Italian Conservatories for more than twenty years. From 1985 Dal'Ongaro started a 30-year collaboration with Rai Radio, becoming Rai 3's Controller of programming between 2000 and 2015, and from 2008 becoming the Director General of Rai National Symphony Orchestra. From 2011 to 2016, he created and established the TV programme Petrushka for Rai5 TV.

He has written several essays on music, among them: La musica tra suono e silenzio in "Atlante del Novecento" (UTET, 3 volumes, 2000), and La musica liquida del XXI Secolo (NOVA, L'Enciclopedia UTET, 2005). In 1986 he published an essay dedicated to the analysis of Giacomo Puccini's works (Pacini Editore, Pisa).

His own compositions, published by Suvini-Zerboni and recorded on several albums, have been performed by the most important Italian and international ensembles (including the Arditti Quartet, Ensemble Recherche, Ensemble 2E2M, Ex-Novo Ensemble). He has collaborated, among others, with several distinguished artists such as Luca Ronconi, Carlo Cecchi, Claudio e Daniele Abbado, Luciano Berio, Michele Serra, Stefano Benni, Alessandro Baricco.

Between 1993 and 1999, he was a music consultant for Romaeuropa Festival, and became President of "Nuova Consonanza" from 1996 to 1999. Other appointments have included Music Programmer for the Venice Biennale Contemporary Music Festival (February 1999-March 2001), continuing as a consultant between 2003 and 2004. He was Vice-President of the "Centro Tempo Reale", founded by Luciano Berio. He is currently a member of the Advisory Board of the Accademia Filarmonica Romana, and of the scientific committee of the "Claudio Abbado" Foundation and of the "Luciano Berio" Study Center. For his work as a producer, he was awarded the "Prix Italia" and also the "Ugo Gregoretti" Prize in 2008. In 2012 the Italian President Giorgio Napolitano awarded him with the title of "Knight of the Order of Merit of the Italian Republic".

In 2008, he became a member of the Accademia Nazionale di Santa Cecilia in Rome, and from the 20th of February 2015 he has been elected as President-Superintendent of this institution and and re-elected to a second term on 26 November 2019.

In 2017, he was named a member of the Steering Committee of the Services Centre for Recreational, Cultural, Artistic, and Performance activities at Rome's Università La Sapienza.



Luigi Dei Rector magnificus, University of Florence

Luigi Dei is full professor of chemistry at the University of Florence. At present he is President (Magnifico Rettore) of the University of Florence. Internationally recognised scholar of material chemistry, he is author of more than 150 papers. Member of the Youth Orchestra of the European Union (EUYO), and first viola of the Solisti Veneti, he played an important concert activity that brought him to the most important halls in the world. He has also passionately developed his role as mentor of some of the best young instrumentalists in business today and of some ensembles among which the name of the Cuarteto Casals and the Quartetto Adorno stands out. He recorded for Dynamic, Stradivarius and Tactus. His teaching activity took him to Europe, Switzerland, the United States and China. Teacher at the Internationale Sommerakademie at the Mozarteum in Salzburg, he has been, on several occasions, tutor at the Mahler Jugend Orchester, and at the Academy of the Mozart Orchestra. For some years he has been part of the teaching staff of the Royal College of Music in London. After teaching string quartet for a decade at the prestigious Escuela Superior de Musica Reina Sofia, he is today the holder of the Chair of Viola at the State Conservatory "G.B. Martini "in Bologna. He is also the author of the text "La viola del Pensiero" and artistic director of the Sesto Rocchi Festival, the first in Italy dedicated to professional and nonprofessional musicians of all ages. For 18 years he was Director of the European Quartet Academy within the ECMA (European Chamber Music Academy), a project of the Fiesole School of Music to perfect and promote young chamber music groups. He is currently President of ESTA Italia European String Teachers Association.



Luca Franzetti Musician for human rights

Born in Parma (Italy) in 1969, **Luca Franzetti** starts to play cello at 17 years old. The first performing concert at 18.

Cristiano Gualco Violinist with the Quartetto di Cremona

Cristiano Gualco is violinist with the Quartetto di Cremona.

Since its formation in 2000, the Quartetto di Cremona has established a reputation as one of the most exciting chamber ensembles on the international stage. Regularly invited to perform in major music festivals in Europe, North and South America, and Far East, they garner universal acclaim for their high level of interpretive artistry. "BBT Fellowship" prize winner in 2005, the Quartetto di Cremona received by the Borletti Buitoni Trust also the "Franco Buitoni Award" (2019 edition) for its constant contribution to the promotion of chamber music in Italy and around the world. In 2020 the Quartetto di Cremona celebrates its first twenty years of career, an important milestone for an Italian ensemble. For the occasion, distinguished concerts and recording projects will be developed over consecutive seasons: several performances of the complete Beethoven quartets' cycle, CD releases, a tour with Bach's "The Art of the Fugue", new music expressly composed for the Quartet. Further 2020/21 season's highlights include concerts in Geneva, Istanbul, Milan, Rome, London (Wigmore Hall) and the debuts at the Carnegie Hall in New York and at the Rudolfinum in Prague. Numerous are the collaborations with artists of the level of Angela Hewitt, Eckart Runge, David Orlowsky, Emerson Quartet. Noteworthy recent recording projects include a double CD dedicated to Schubert and featuring cellist Eckart Runge. The album was recorded with the Stradivarius set of instruments named "Paganini Quartet", on kind loan from the Nippon Music Foundation (Tokyo), and attracted high levels of acclaim in the international press. Same goes for the Beethoven's string quartets cycle: the eight volumes won prestigious awards (including Echo Klassik 2017 and ICMA 2018) and received numerous recognitions from specialized critics. Expected in Fall 2020 the release of "Italian Postcards", a new album including works by Wolf, Mozart, Čajkovskij and a brand-new piece by Nimrod Borenstein. Frequently invited to present masterclasses in Europe, Asia, North and South America, since 2011 they are Professors at the "Walter Stauffer Academy" in Cremona. They are ambassadors for the international project "Friends of Stradivari" and honorary citizens of Cremona, UNESCO Cultural Heritage for violin making. Flavio Keller Professor of Human Physiology and Director of the Developmental Neuroscience lab at the Campus Bio-Medico University of Rome

Dr. Flavio Keller is Professor of Physiology, and Head of the Laboratory of Developmental Neuroscience, at University Campus Bio-Medico in Rome. He is also a member of the Perception-Movement-Action Research Consortium at the University of Edinburgh. He received his M.D. degree from the University of Zurich in 1982. He worked first at the Institute of Pharmacology of the University of Zurich with P.G. Waser, on molecular mechanisms of axon guidance and axon-target interactions. From 1988 to 1991 he was postdoctoral fellow with E.R. Kandel at the Center for Neurobiology and Behavior, and Howard Hughes Medical Institute, Columbia University. From 1991 to 1994 he was a postdoctoral fellow with M.E. Schwab at the Brain Research Institute of the University of Zurich. In 1993 he moved to University Campus Bio-Medico, where he became full professor of Physiology in 2002. Here he has been working on molecular mechanisms of brain development, in particular serotonin and Reelin, a candidate gene for autism, focusing on interactions of the Reelin gene with sex hormones, to understand the male prevalence of autism. More recently, he has started an intense collaboration with engineers in the field of motor development and cognitive motor physiology, aiming at developing tools and strategies to understand infant behavior. His most recent field of interest is music perception, especially in children. He is author of many publications in scientific journals, such as Science, Journal of Neuroscience, Molecular Psychiatry. He has also written book chapters on the physiology of emotions, the body-mind problem, and the problem of free will. He has received many research grants, including grants from the European Union, the NIH, and Autism Speaks. Since 2016, he is also promoter and Conductor of the Chamber orchestra of University Campus Bio-Medico.



Corina Kolbe Journalist and music critic, Berlin

Corina Kolbe holds a university degree in Romance Studies, German Philology and History. As a Berlin-based freelance journalist and music critic she writes for newspapers and magazines, such as Neue Zürcher Zeitung, Der Spiegel, II Corriere Musicale, Crescendo, Rondo or Das Orchester. She is also a regular contributor to magazines and program books published by orchestras and festivals, such as Lucerne Festival, Dresdner Philharmonie or Alte Oper Frankfurt. In collaboration with the Italian Cultural Institute IIC, Società Dante Alighieri, Teatro Comunale di Ferrara and Civico Museo Teatrale Carlo Schmidl, Trieste she curated film screenings and panel discussions in memory of the conductor Claudio Abbado.



Alexander Lonquich Concert pianist and Artistic Director Scuola di Musica di Fiesole

In 1977 Alexander Longuich won the First Prize at the Casagrande Competition: since then he has given concerts in all the main musical centres of the world; he has collaborated with orchestra conductors such as Claudio Abbado, Ton Koopman, Emmanuel Krivine, Heinz Holliger, Sandor Vègh and many others. In the chamber music field, Alexander Lonquich collaborates with esteemed partners such as Nicolas Altstaedt, Vilde Frang, Joshua Bell, Isabelle Faust, Carolin Widmann and Jörg Widmann, to name a few. Alexander Lonquich has received numerous awards from Italian and international critics, such as the "Diapason d'Or" and the "Premio Abbiati" (as 'best soloist' in 2016). In the role of conductor/soloist he collaborated with the Orchestra da Camera di Mantova, the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, the Deutsche Kammerphilharmonie, the Mahler Chamber Orchestra, the Orchestre des Champs Elysées, the Filarmonica della Scala, the Orchestra Sinfonica Nazionale RAI and the Accademia Nazionale di Santa Cecilia. Alexander Lonquich is a regular guest of internationally renowned festivals including Schubertiade, Lockenhaus, Mozartwoche Salzburg in Austria, Beethovenfest Bonn and Ludwigsburger Schlossfestspielen in Germany. Among the most relevant engagements outside Italy we mention collaborations with the Stuttgarter Kammerorchester, the Münchener Kammerorchester, the Camerata Salzburg. Very active also in the recording field, his most recent publication (October 2018) is a double CD for the Alpha-Outhere label entitled "Schubert 1828" and containing the Sonatas D958, D959 and D960. Since 2014 Alexander Longuich has been Principal Conductor of Orchestra del Teatro Olimpico in Vicenza. Since September 2020 he has been appointed as Artistic Director of Fondazione Scuola di Musica di Fiesole O.n.l.u.s. In 2013 he created, together with his wife Cristina Barbuti, 'Kantoratelier', a theatrical space where his favourite subjects - psychology, music and theatre - are studied and developed thanks to workshops, seminars and concerts.

Maria Majno

Vice president of the Pierfranco and Luisa Mariani Foundation for child neurology, Milan. Direction Neuroscience and Music section Vice president of the "Sistema Europe" network

Maria Majno is a musician, musicologist, manager and graduate of both Milan's Conservatoire and its State University.

During her extensive tenure as the artistic and executive director of the Società del Quartetto di Milano, Maria Majno oversaw a number of thematically based seasons as well as a complete performance of Bach's Cantatas. And, since 2002, she has been involved in the international network of European Mozart Ways. In this network of the 10 countries visited by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, Maria Majno coordinates initiatives in the areas of performance, scholarly research, publishing and educational projects. Since 2006, she has been the president of the association.

Furthermore, Maria Majno is part of the culture management and economics faculty at the Università Cattolica in Milan and is a founding member of the SIMM [The Social Impact of Making Music] platform. As the vice president of the Mariani Foundation for Paediatric Neurology, she is in charge of activities which look at the relationship between the neurosciences and music, in particular, at those which focus on cognitive and rehabilitation issues. In a continuation of her work in this field, she also cooperates with the Università Statale Milano Bicocca and the Università di Pavia on research projects which assess the social and cognitive impact of music education.

Heeding the call of Claudio Abbado, Maria Majno has been instrumental in helping to initiate the global presence of Sistema and still leads SONG - Sistema in Lombardia, which spearheads Sistema approaches within Italy. On top of her Sistema roles within Italy, Maria Majno also serves as the vice president of the Sistema Europe association and is often invited to contribute her eclectic expertise to articles, conferences and university courses.

In 2008 she was invited by Prof. Vernikov to collaborate with him in numerous master classes

in Italy, Israel and Austria. From 2008 to 2011 she was co-pricipal in the Orquestra Palau de Les Arts Reina Sofia in Valencia (Spain), where principal conductors were Maestri L. Maazel and Z. Mehta.

Since 2010 she teaches at the Scuola di Musica di Fiesole in Italy.

Until 2013 she worked as an Assistant of Prof. Pavel Vernikov at the Haut Ecole de Musique de Lausanne (Site de Sion) in Switzerland and at many Master Classes in Austria, Italy, France, Switzerland and Japan.

She also performed as a violinist at many festivals in Austria, Italy, France, Switzerland and Japan. Since 2014 she works as a Professor for Violin at the Haut Ecole de Musique de Lausanne in Switzerland.

She plays a violin by Nicola Gagliano made in 1738.



Michele Napolitano Choral conductor

Choral conductor, singer and composer, **Michele Napolitano** graduated in Choral Music and Choral Conducting with M° P. P. Scattolin and received MA's Degree in Vocal Composition and Choral Conducting at the Conservatory of Rovigo. He specialized with M° R. His published volumes on these composers have become central to our understanding of their works: L'opera di Luigi Dallapiccola. Catalogo Ragionato (Milan, Suvini Zerboni, 2002); J.S. Bach. Lo specchio di Dio e il segreto dell'immagine riflessa (Florence, Polistampa, 2012); Luigi Dallapiccola e le Arti figurative (Venice, Marsilio, 2016). Ruffini's meetings with Laura Dallapiccola (thanks to whom he became permanent guest conductor of the M.P. Musorgskji Opera and Ballet Theatre in St. Petersburg from 1989 to 1995) and with Max Seidel (thanks to whom he became Head of the Department of Music and Figurative Arts at the Kunsthistorisches Institut in Florenz – Max-Planck-Institut from 2002 to 2018) were fundamentally important to his career. In 2005-2010 Ruffini directed the newly created Carlo Prosperi Fund at the "Bonsanti" Contemporary Archives of the Gabinetto Vieusseux. Since 2010 he has frequently volunteered at the Sollicciano Prison, where he has carried out countless musical activities for the inmates and founded the "Luigi Dallapiccola" Music School for the children of prison guards. He currently teaches at the "Luigi Cherubini" Conservatory of Music and is president of the Luigi Dallapiccola Study Center.
